# GROWING SHOW DAHLIAS IN POTS

For several years now I have been experimenting with growing my dahlias in plastic pots in the ground. Each year I have refined the method and increased the number to the extent that this year, 90% of my show dahlias will be grown in a soil-less media in pots. Most are grown in 250mm (10") diameter pots, although cultivars with small tubers grow quite easily in 200mm (8") diameter pots. I have found that for some strange reason Pompon dahlias struggle in pots so this year I will grow them in the ground.

In my experience dahlias require constant moisture and good drainage, a real challenge when growing in pots. I use a coarse sand / coir peat mixture in a ratio of 2 parts sand to 1 part coir. This mixture can be varied depending on the known susceptibility of some cultivars to rot. I use slightly more sand and less coir to provide better drainage with cultivars such as L'Ancrese and Jan Lennon. With such

good drainage and to some extent poor water holding capacity, the number of tubers produced for the following year can be down compared to ground grown plants. This trade-off is worth it for me as my time commitment for digging and dividing is significantly reduced with this method.

My 12 month planting pattern is as follows :

October : Plant tubers out in pots

Feb. / March : Flowering & dahlia shows

April : Cut back bushes

May : Lift most pots and place intact in shed

Sept. / October : remove from pots, divide and replant.

## DAHLIA TUBER AUCTION TIPS

Part of Ted J. Kennedy's article from Portland Dahlia Society (USA)  
April 2010 Bulletin – reprinted with permission  
*Editor's additions in italics*

**(1) Look at the tubers before the auction :** The auction tubers are laid out *(in boxes supplied by each grower)*. It really pays to look there before the auction to get an idea what will be sold.

**(2) Sign up for a bidder's number :** We have gone to a system where you *(register for)* a bidder's number and your winning bid is recorded each time you win. You will pay for your tubers at the end of the auction.

**(3) You may be able to buy a tuber if you are one of the *(unsuccessful)* bidders :**

Some varieties have more than one than one tuber available. In that case, we offer the winning bidder the opportunity to buy as many as he or she would like and the *(remaining)* tubers are available at that same price to losing bidders. Occasionally, even non-bidders may be able to buy a tuber at the auction price.

**(4) Prices Decline Near the End :** Prices generally get lower as time goes by *(and bargains often become available)*.

**(5) *Cultivar Images shown on screen :*** *Images typical of the flowers of most cultivars to be auctioned will be shown on a big screen, to benefit new growers.*

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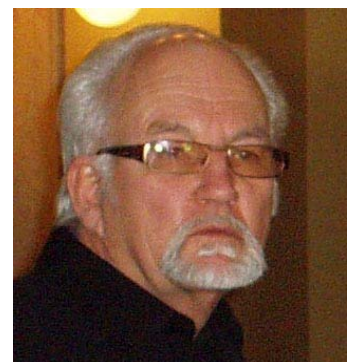
## 2010 AUSTRALIA DAHLIA CONFERENCE SHEPPARTON VICTORIA

PART 2

The annual Australian conference was this year held June 11-14 at Shepparton, a fruit growing region in rural Victoria. Part 1 of this article was printed in the July 2010 issue.

**Dr. Keith Hammett** started proceedings on Sunday morning with his presentation on the 'Dangers of being an Exhibitor only Society'. Keith began with noting that the dahlia was the ultimate sports flower – the more work that goes in, the better the results.

Outlining the history of the dahlia flower, Keith urged that lessons be learnt from past errors. Until the end of the



19<sup>th</sup> century Ball dahlias were shown exclusively, with other seedling types rogued out, until Decorative dahlias became popular. Decoratives were so named as a comparison with the traditional Ball. Fancy Decoratives were bicoloured where the inside colour of a floret was a different colour to the outside. Cactus dahlias were originally very informal until breeding refined the form. We are now focussing on Decorative and Cactus dahlias just as growers focussed on Ball dahlias in the 1800's.

Leaves were introduced at dahlia shows originally as an indicator of plant disease. In shows during the 1930's, leaves became necessary in the USA, with West Coast shows requiring one set of leaves and East Coast shows requiring two sets of leaves on the stem of the flower. Leaves are also used elsewhere in the world and often the reason for displaying them has been forgotten.

Keith considered that we should stand back and review the way things have been done and consider alternative options. Otherwise we won't be able to advance and may end up in a cul-de-sac, as was the case with the Ball dahlias in the 1800's. Conserve that which has been achieved and explore new ideas.

**Anne Menzel** gave an entertaining talk on 'Dahlias over the last 30 years from the Ladies/Wife/Slave/Servant point of view' based on her experiences with husband John. Beginning as novice growers, Anne listed the trials she and John endured when starting out – just getting a tuber to grow into a bush and then flower was a challenge. Once their growing technique improved John became interested in showing. Anne recalled one occasion early on when they spent hours cutting and packing just 13 flowers and as much time again staging these precious flowers after several hours travel to Adelaide.

Over the years, methods of staging and transportation of the flowers have changed. Initially they used styrafoam and cork to plug bottles, now oasis is used. Anne and John originally used to pack fimbriated cactus together in the same crate until they found that the florets of adjoining flowers used to knit together during transport and were too difficult to separate. And the most important issue for transporting flowers – know where the bumps in the road are.

In 1988, Anne and John embarked on the challenge of transporting their dahlias overseas to Christchurch in New Zealand to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the New Zealand Dahlia Society. They exhibited 96 flowers which had been carefully packed in four cardboard boxes, each bloom with a rubber balloon water reservoir attached to the cut stem.

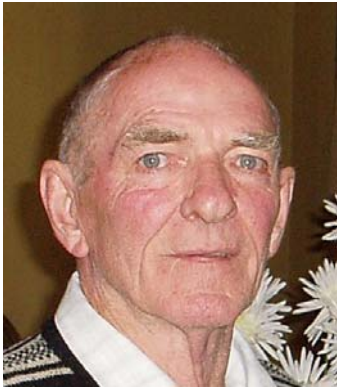
These days Anne and John's methods have been refined with experience. Before a show, almost every room in the house is used for packing. Flowers are cut before 8.30am as the weather gets too hot after that. Neck stretchers and bonnets are now used on growing blooms to achieve the perfect flower for the show bench. Written records are kept of planting and what grew. Steel posts with twine strands weaving around the plant stems keeps the plants in place with less tying required.

Assistance from experienced growers in learning how to grow and show is part of the process. Anne recalled Joyce Parker who helped with staging, and Les



Williams who recommended looking into the flower, not at the flower. Other friends and mentors include Reg and Barbara Kappler, Keith Hammett on their 1988 New Zealand trip, Wayne Holland at the 2004 Seattle ADS Conference, and Dave and Carmen Spencer from the UK.

Anne's lesson of thirty years : What works for you, may not work for me, and 'keep an open mind'.



**Bob Yoemans** reported on the development of his Tiny Tot bedding dahlias. Bob discovered a long stemmed seedling with a gold flowered bedding dahlia in 2005 and named it 'Gold Strike'. Bob started crossing and in 2007 twelve varieties were selected. Bob has classified two groups of his new plants – Tiny Tots which grow up to 70cm high and Border dahlias which grow over 70cm high. None of these need staking or tying.

In 2006 Bob crossed Gold Strike with Razzamattaz (a cerise micro-single bedding dahlia) to produce a seedling. In 2007 the resultant seedling was crossed back with Gold Strike to produce the new varieties. The selected varieties were all chosen for colour, long stems and plenty of blooms. Varieties of Tiny Tots include : **Gold Casket, Snow White, Hell Fire, Goblin**. Border varieties include : **Captain Wizard, Princess Jade, Wicked Star, and Sir Bob**.

Plants should be spaced at 30cm intervals and raised beds are recommended for clay soils.

Bob suggested that there should be room for these dahlias in a show schedule. These bedding dahlias are ideal for staging in oasis in baskets and should be judged on impact and emphasis on colour.

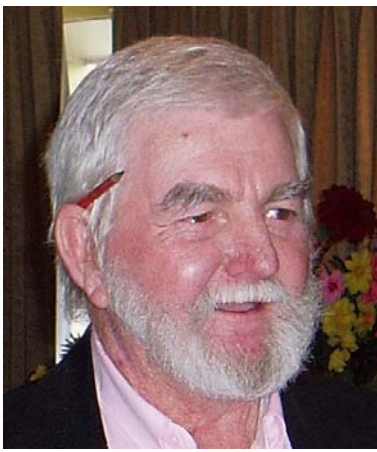
These bedding dahlias will soon be available through Garden Express under the **Mini Marvel** range.

Garden Express Managing Director **David van Berkel** explained the commercial operations at his family business. Originally named Van Berkel Bulbs in the 1950's, the business changed in 1968 to Bulb Express and later incorporated other companies to become Garden Express which today packages 1,000,000 bulb items annually.

The Wollemi Pine is now propagated and distributed by Garden Express.

David said he is always looking for new products and making commercial arrangements for marketing new varieties of plants, Mini Marvel dahlias for example.





**John Menzel** gave the final address for the 2010 conference entitled 'Dahlias Looking Forward – Looking Back'.

Past growers should be respected for their mentoring efforts to new growers. John recognised Reg Kappler, Ted Griffin and Les Williams.

John analysed entries in a 1930's dahlia catalogue and 1940's show schedule. The catalogue advertised a new cultivar at ½ of the weekly wage, relatively much more expensive than a present day catalogue. The 1949 show schedule had a championship class of 50 vases with four types and prizemoney of £2.00 (the equivalent of \$1000 in today's money).

In the present, ideas formulated at a Dahlia Society of Australia conference can be taken back and considered by each group.

Dahlia activities in the future will be influenced by smaller garden plots, competing outdoor activities, rotating events, co-staging shows and sharing resources with other special interest groups. Show suggestions include : exhibitors and judges to be better looked after, grace period to change non-compliant championship entries, point judging as a quicker and transparent system, recognition of other 'odd-bod' types such as blends, mini marvels, and purple leaved varieties.
